# **Uni Words**

Word	Meaning
Faculty	The academic staff who work in a division or school at a university, or even the school itself, like the Education Faculty or the Engineering Faculty.
Degree	A degree is the standard university qualification and is recognised worldwide.
Bachelor Degree	The first degree you study at university is called a bachelor degree e.g., Bachelor of Arts. Bachelor degree courses take three to five years to complete.
Undergraduate	A person who has not yet completed their bachelor degree.
Fresher	A new undergraduate. A first year student.

	A course is a block of subjects or units that make up the degree.

The loan scheme students borrow from to pay some of the highest university charges in the world is called "HELP" - The Higher Education Loan Program.

The website that provides information about how to borrow money to subsidise your tertiary education is called <u>Study Assist!</u>

Students applying for tertiary education loans will need to get a Tax File Number.

# **Training Items**

#### **OLNA - A new testing tool for TAFE admissions**

#### What are the minimum standards?

The minimum requirements for school leavers for direct entry to full time TAFE Certificate II and III courses are:

- completing a Certificate I or II qualification;
- year 9 National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy Band 8; or
- meeting the OLNA standard.

#### Are there alternative entry pathways?

For prospective students who do not meet these standards to gain entry they can:

- sit a TAFE Admissions literacy and/or numeracy test administered by Training Sector Services;
- 2. be referred to a TAFE college for a Learning Area Assessment; or
- 3. enrol in a course that does not have literacy or numeracy requirements, including foundation skills, equity courses and Certificate I courses.

#### What happens if you are required to sit the test?

Applicants who are required to sit the OLNA testing are booked into test sessions conducted at the Department's Prospect Place site and regional college campuses.



Familiarisation sessions of the online and assessment environment and practice tests are being offered to enrolling applicants before the actual testing schedules taking place between the 31 May and 16 June 2017. Students must book into both through TAFE Admissions.

Government Apprenticeship Site

The Australian government has a <u>website</u> that provides a truckload of information on how to find an apprenticeship, Australian <u>skills shortage needs</u> (there are a lot of them) and who provides apprentice support services in WA.

Anyone who is thinking about an apprenticeship or traineeship should go through this site with a career advisor.



Word	Meaning
Certificate l	This is entry level training that gives foundation skills. Anyone who graduates from school will have qualifications above Cert I
Certificate II	Entry level for many vocational occupations. Graduates of Cert II will have a basic understanding of the job.
Certificate III	This is getting into the vocation with much more skill. A licensed electrician has a Cert III and it usually takes 4 years to complete the apprenticeship.
Certificate IV	This is getting into management roles. A Cert IV holder will have sound skills in a vocational area and have enough knowledge of the industry to start exercising sound judgement and solve problems.
Diploma	Diplomas demonstrate high level of specialised vocational knowledge and skills in an industry. Workers may choose to study a Diploma in order to gain management skills for a vocation. The high level of competence of diploma holders is often recognised by universities which award credit for study in a degree program.
Advanced Diploma	Graduates at this level will have broad knowledge and be highly skilled for work in a vocation. These are high level vocational skills. The knowledge can usually be transferred to academic qualifications like a bachelor's degree.
RTO	Registered Training Organisation. A college that is registered by government to deliver certified training.
SPOL	State Priority Occupation List. This list shows government where there will be skills shortages and therefore where it should give the greatest subsidies for courses.
RPL	Recognition of Prior Learning. You can apply to have skills you learned in the workplace recognised in order to get a qualification.
Apprenticeships and Traineeships	<ul> <li>Apprenticeships tend to be in traditional trades like plumbing and traineeships are in non-trade areas like business. They both involve: <ul> <li>a combination of work and study.</li> <li>finding an employer who is willing for you to go to college 1 day per week or in blocks of study a couple of times a year</li> <li>getting on the job training</li> <li>getting paid a training wage while you get your qualification</li> </ul> </li> </ul>



Pre Apprenticeship	A pre-apprenticeship is a Certificate II program that includes a period of workplace experience coordinated by a training provider. The aim is to provide you with industry specific training, combined with adequate time in a real workplace to gain skills, knowledge and behaviours to enable transition into a full apprenticeship.
	A pre apprenticeship is often a pathway to an apprenticeship as employers call lecturers and ask them to recommend a good student to employ.
	TIPS for getting a pre apprenticeship:
	When applying for a Pre Apprenticeship you may need to do an interview. Take along photos of your work in a portfolio to impress the interview panel. Dress in the sort of clothes they would wear to work, office clothes for an office job, and smart casual for a building trade. Sporting and volunteer experience as well as school results and industry experience will help to impress the panel. Places in pre apprenticeships are usually limited so you should prepare well for the interview.
Group Training Organisation	Group training organisations are employers of apprentices and trainees.
	They were started up when there was a shortage apprenticeships and traineeships. Their role was to coordinate a group of small businesses who may have been able to employ an apprentice plumber for example for one day per week.
	By hiring an apprentice and coordinating their work across a number of employers the number of people able to gain a qualification increased.
	Today apprentices and trainees may be employed by a group training organisation and find themselves employed full time with one employer who prefers to have all of the government papers and qualifications managed by an expert organisation.
Unit	A course is made up of a number of units. A unit is a block of skills grouped together within a course. For example, there is a Certificate I Business Communications course made up of 6 Units including the Unit Apply basic communication skills.
Competency	A competency is a skill you are required to learn. It is made up of an element of competency and performance criteria. e.g <b>Element</b> <i>Identify workplace communication procedures</i> . <b>Performance Criteria</b> <i>Identify appropriate lines of communication with supervisors and colleagues</i>





# **Support for Apprentice Electricians**

There is a Master Electricians association. It provides information and support for young people wanting to become electricians. Getting a mentor from the Master Electricians may help you to get an apprenticeship. It's worth a try.

The <u>TradeUp Australia</u> site is designed to provide information and support to women going into nontraditional trades.

#### **Air Force Trade Jobs**

I am not sure why the <u>air force is promoting trades</u> so heavily at the moment. At the Careers Expo the Defence recruiting team said that they are getting lots of applicants for places at the moment and that they therefore had no plans to strengthen their work experience program.






#### **Redmond in Derby**

The FIRST Robotics Competition is run in Australia and across the world. It is a large scale robotics competition where the students have just under 6 weeks to build a robot with the help of mentors to then compete in Sydney in the FRC National competition. The game is played on an 8 x 16m field and is played by 'alliances' of three teams each. Have a look at the website link attached for more information.

#### What could your students do with \$20?


The answer might surprise you.

Developed by the Foundation for Young Australians (FYA) and the National Australia Bank, \$20 Boss is an inschool challenge, run by teachers, which provides your students \$20 of start-up money to create their own



business. At the end of the program, students are encouraged to pay back the start-up money, with a \$1 legacy payment. It's a fantastic way to engage young people in an immersive experience at school that encourages their entrepreneurial spirit.


